The Egrets landing subdivision is expanding; and, the Hogg Bayou Bridge (Deborah Drive area) should be reopened by the end of the year.

In mid-town Monroe, business expansion continues on near Tower Drive. Local developers purchased the former Chase/Wingspan building on N. 19th. Now known as Tower Place, it is an ideal location for both large-scale employers and small businesses looking for a collaborative workspace. Downtown Monroe continues to be a hot-bed for development and fun activities. The success of our Downtown RiverMarket, Art Crawls, River Jams and multiple holiday events continue to show investors that downtown is the place to be.

A few days ago, we celebrated our annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony. Lights are on at City Hall, the civic center, city hall annex south, and throughout downtown Monroe.
